

Celebrated Victorian author Elizabeth Gaskell spent much of her childhood in Knutsford, where she was brought up by her aunt, after her mother died when she was only 13 months old. The town was later immortalised in her novel *Cranford* and this, together with *Mary Barton* and *North and South* have been re-imagined many times for the TV and silver screen.



More recently, author Nell Stevens, Associate Professor of Creative Writing at the University of Warwick, has sought to explore the woman behind the bestsellers, with a fanciful tale of two parallel doomed love affairs, in her 2018 novel *Mrs Gaskell and Me*, which won the 2019 Somerset Maugham Award.



The Frodsham Flash Fiction Prize is open to any UK resident. Stories can be about any subject. Or take inspiration from the festival theme 'A Celebration of Cheshire'.



How to enter

All entries will be judged anonymously. Do not include your name, address or any identifying mark on the story document, other than the story title at the top of the first page.

You can enter online or by post. For a full list of competition rules or to submit an online entry, go to www.weaverwords.org.uk.

For postal entries, stories should be typed. Each entry should be accompanied by a separate sheet of paper giving the entrant's name, address, date of birth, contact telephone number and email address (if available). You should also include on this sheet, the title(s) of your story(s). You can enter as many stories as you like but each flash fiction piece must be accompanied by an entry fee of £6. Please enclose a cheque for the total made out to Frodsham Community Association.
